SPARE SOME FOR AUTISM ORGANIZATION AWARDS \$2,000 IN GRANTS TO WAKE
COUNTY PUBLIC SCHOOL SYSTEM

RALEIGH, Sept. 2, 2026 – Spare Some for Autism (SSfA), in partnership with the Fall Line of Zebulon, North Carolina and Jumping for Autism, will be selecting Educators within the Wake County Public School System (WCPSS) to receive up to \$250 in grant monies.

SSfA and its partners will donate \$2,000 in grant monies, no more than \$250 per request for supplies, activities, field trips or any other requests directly affecting the students in the classroom. Grant eligibility consists of “any classroom, Pre-K to 12th Grade, in WCPSS.”

Beth Jarvis, Founder of Spare Some for Autism said, “Our family feels very strongly about giving back to the community. In starting SSfA over 21 years ago, we always wanted a grassroots 501c3 charity, touching individuals in ways that large charities may not be able to. We have no paid staff; only unpaid volunteers and we are grateful to everyone who works with us helping the Special Ed community. We focus on helping individuals see their full potential. We have been very fortunate to be in the position to help the WCPSS educational community, and hope that in some way that these grants can help educators who are on the front line and bring forward our families’ vision of inclusion to all.”

Applications will be accepted from now through September 30, 2026. Notification of awards will be made by October 30, 2026.

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Spare Some for Autism improves the lives of individuals with ASD and their families in North Carolina by sharing resources and affecting autism legal reform through statewide collaboration and advocacy.
